Dear Friends in Christ,



With this newsletter, our look at the emphases of Witness, Mercy, and Life Together draws to a close. Jesus preserves His witness in the church, and then uses us as His witnesses. Jesus is merciful to you so that you will show mercy to others. And now we consider the life together that Jesus gives us within His church.

When Jesus makes you His own, He connects you to Himself, and He also connects you with the rest of the Church. You can't be a "lone ranger" Christian. You cannot live a Christian life without being part of a larger community. It's just not the way that Jesus does things.

Picture a wheel. All the spokes are connected to a central hub, but they are also connected to one another. You are a spoke, connected to Jesus Christ, the hub, but you are also connected to fellow Christians within the church.

Jesus Christ puts us together within the Church for our own good, so that we can support and care for each other. You may wake up one morning and think, "I'm doing fine. I don't need to be in church." You may be doing fine, but your fellow Christians often struggle. They may need your love and encouragement. Our life together is about sharing our pains and disappointments, and supporting each other in difficult times.

But just as we come together in times of suffering, we also come together in times of rejoicing. We celebrate together as we receive our Lord's blessings, and join with one another in giving thanks. Whether it's a baptism or wedding, birthday or anniversary we come together in these times of celebration to share in our joy.

Our life together is most visible on Sunday mornings, especially as we gather around the altar to eat and drink Jesus' body and blood. This sharing is called "communion" as we are all united by our common participation in the body of Christ. This communion flows from the altar to our time together as we share meals and socialize outside of the Divine Service.

The holidays can be a lonely time, especially for those who are not connected to Jesus Christ and His body, the Church. As you meet people who are isolated and alone, invite them to join us and share in our Lord's blessings, especially with our many holiday services coming up in the weeks ahead. The Lord has made you part of this fellowship, so that you will also draw other people into our life together.

As you prepare to celebrate our Savior's birth, remember the words of the angel, "Fear not, for behold, I bring you good news of great joy that will be for **all the people**. For unto you is born this day in the city of David a Savior, who is Christ the Lord."

January Happenings

January 1

To most of the world, January 1 signals the beginning of a new calendar year. In the church, our year begins in Advent, but January 1 is still important. Luke tells us that Jesus was circumcised and given His name on His eighth day of life (Luke 2:21). Since we celebrate Christmas on December 25, this makes January 1 the Feast of the Circumcision and Name of Jesus. This year January 1 falls on a Sunday, which means that we get to celebrate this feast together at Faith. So before you turn to the parades and bowl games, come to church and celebrate Jesus and His Saving Name.

Epiphany Service

Once again, Faith has been asked to host our joint circuit Epiphany service. The service will be at 7:00p on Thursday, January 5, with a potluck dinner at 5:45p and choir rehearsal at 6:30p. 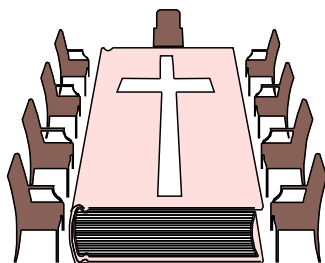
Hymns of the Month

December: (Advent): "The King Shall Come When Morning Dawns" (# 348)

The origins of this hymn are as mysterious as its haunting melody. The author, John Brownlie, included it in a collection of his translations from the early Greek Orthodox Church, but the original version was never found. Perhaps he wrote it himself in the style of these early hymns. The text compares the coming of Jesus Christ to the dawning of a new day. It will be brighter than His first coming at Bethlehem, and even brighter than Easter morning, as He comes again with glory on the last day.

January: (Epiphany): "O God of God, O Light of Light" (810)

This hymn was written by John Julian, an Anglican priest, and first sung at a choir festival on April 16, 1883. Julian studied church music and published a dictionary of over 400,000 hymns (he did not include any of his own, due to modesty). This song begins and ends with a vision of the glories of heaven. The middle verses tell of Jesus' birth, life, death and resurrection, and especially the Old Testament prophecies that promised these events. The language may seem a little out of date, but the grand poetry adds to the beauty of this hymn of praise.
