Dear Friends in Christ,

A few weeks ago, Pastor Hans Fiene of River of Life Lutheran in Channahon shared this parable:

“Once upon a time, Hazel sewed her family's clothes. She lived in an era when there were no department stores or major clothing labels. And Hazel's family couldn't afford the services of the nearest tailor, so Hazel sewed because that's what was necessary to survive. And because it was necessary to survive, Hazel taught this skill to her daughter Sarah.

“When Sarah grew up and had her own family, she found that this skill was no longer a necessity. For a reasonable cost, and with the aid of a department store or a catalog, she could contract someone else to do the hard work of measuring and cutting and stitching. But even though she didn't need to sew anymore, Sarah still pulled out the Singer from time to time. She'd sit down with her daughter Kimberly in her lap and make a garment or two around Christmas. Sarah did this because the feel of the thread on her fingertips and the vibrations of the sewing machine on her palms reminded her of her mother, and she wanted to give some of those memories to her child.

“But Kimberly couldn't even tell you how to thread a needle anymore. Her grandmother sewed out of necessity. Her mother sewed out of nostalgia. But Kimberly doesn't sew at all because, without necessity, nostalgia rarely makes it to the second generation.

“The Christian faith is necessary. You are dead without it and nothing in this world can replace the salvation that Jesus gives to those who hear and believe His Word. But when your pastor doesn't see you for months at a time, when you let every conflict bump the Divine Service off your Sunday schedule, when you never talk theology with your children, you teach them that the Word of God is nothing more than a trinket we pull out of the closet whenever we want to taste the sweetness of our familial heritage. And when you teach that to your children, your children will not grow up to be Christians. They will not believe any more than Kimberly sews.”

Passing on the faith to your children can certainly be a struggle. We need to be sure that our kids and grandkids realize that going to church is not just one another recreational activity - something that we do simply because we enjoy it. They will quickly find other activities that they find to be more fun, relaxing, or interesting.

While we certainly should enjoy going to church, we go first and foremost because we need to. We need to be forgiven, and church is where Jesus gives out forgiveness. Skipping church is like skipping a medical treatment. We don't skip going to dialysis or chemotherapy just because we don't feel like it or have something better to do. We recognize how important and necessary it is, and so we make sacrifices so that we can be there and receive the treatment that we need. People who don't go to church tend to think that either they don't have any sins to be forgiven, or that they can find forgiveness elsewhere.

The good news is that the forgiveness we receive from Jesus is free, and that, no matter how long we have been away from Him, He's always ready to welcome us back home.

Hymn of the Month

October: "O Little Flock, Fear Not the Foe"

The Thirty Years' war was fought in Europe from 1618 - 1648 over the issue of the Reformation. When it seemed as though the Lutherans would be crushed, King Gustavus Adolphus of Sweden came to the rescue. A pivotal battle was fought at Lützen on Nov. 16, 1632. Before the battle the king held a prayer service and requested that this hymn be sung. Gustavus Adolphus led his troops into battle without any armor, trusting in the Lord to protect him. He died in battle that day, but his army won the victory. We are reminded that we continue to fight, not against earthly enemies, but against Satan and his host. Our only hope is through Jesus Christ, who has won the victory for us.

Hymn of the Month

November: "Jerusalem the Golden"

In the 12th century, a monk named Bernard of Cluny wrote a 3,000 line poem entitled De Contemptu Mundi ("Concerning Contempt for the World"). This work contrasts the corruption and evil of our present world with the bliss and glory of the new creation. John Mason Neale translated portions of this poem in the mid-1800s, which later became four different hymns: "Brief Life is Here Our Portion" (TLH # 448); "The World Is Very Evil" (TLH # 605); "For Thee, O Dear, Dear Country" (TLH # 614) and "Jerusalem the Golden." This final hymn focuses on the beauty and joy of heaven, and so is fitting as we celebrate All Saints' Day and the end of the Church Year.
